THE LORD HAS RISEN!

Jesus Christ has Risen, Alleluia! Alleluia! No matter what the headline of the daily news is today, we've got bigger news: Jesus Christ has risen. That is the headline; here is the story: In the beginning God made us. Then we separated ourselves from God—the source of life itself—and brought death into our world and into our lives. Then God, out of his love for us, refused to accept the destruction we brought onto ourselves, so he sent his Son, who became one of us and died for us. Then the Lord rose from the dead. And He still loves us. No news, domestic or foreign, is more interesting than that. Two-thousand years ago, Peter declared to the nations the Good News of Jesus Christ and that everyone who believes in him will receive forgiveness of sins through his name.

What an amazing offer: forgiveness of sins through his name! Jesus crossed over to the realms of death and brought back victory through his Cross. And what a victory! What else could we want!

Two-thousand years ago, those to whom Peter spoke received this news with joy. This was the answer to a question which consumed their lives. Christianity grew from a handful of people to two billion strong. Has this message lost its power now? Can news that is two-thousand years old still be news? At our Easter vigil six people—Shannon, Danny, Kirsty, Carol, Megan and Todd—were welcomed into the Church. The news of love and forgiveness still has power. This good news is still powerful. It is the only solution to our problems. So long as sin remains in the world, we will need the Lord's love and forgiveness. So long as sin has power in our souls, we will need the forgiveness of sins and the restoration of both our bodies and our souls.

The resurrection is not only about something that happens after we die. The Resurrection is taking place right now in our lives. It is the potential for our lives to be different, to be amazing, for us to be saints living lives of love and joy.

If the Resurrection of Jesus Christ was only about an innocent man recovering from death, we would be happy for him. But if the Resurrection signifies that Jesus Christ went down to Hell and destroyed the power of death and ascended to Heaven ... then God is victorious, and his victory, because it was all done for us, is our victory as well. Happy Easter!!

THE POWER OF EVANGELIZATION

From time to time you hear a story that impacts you. I recently heard one such story from a parishioner who just happened to stop by the office. She was looking for an extra copy of Rediscover Jesus by Matthew Kelly (the book we are reading as a parish). I asked her how she liked the book and it began a great conversation.

She shared with me that she had been in a grocery store recently and had bumped into a young man. They were looking at the same fruit and that discussion somehow led to a conversation about him not being perfect. This parishioner quickly shared that no one was perfect except of course for Jesus. Also that Jesus loved us for all those imperfections because he created us purposely that way. She then asked if he knew about Jesus.

Can you imagine hearing this question or even asking this question? Her bravery to share Jesus' love is what touched me the most.

Upon asking this young man this question he said he wanted to know more. So she asked him if she gave him a book if he would read it. If he would really read it and not throw it to the side. He gave her his word. She then pulled out a copy (her copy) of Rediscovering Jesus. He took it and thanked her with the biggest hug he could give. They both teared up genuinely moved by what had just happened. She may never run into this man again, but she has left some imprint on his heart. Isn't this what Jesus meant when he said "to love others as he has loved us."

I can't help but think that this may be the mustard seed that this young man needed to "rediscover" what he means to Jesus. This parishioner's obedient response to listen to the prompting of the Holy Spirit could have changed the course of this man's life forever!

It reminded me to never dismiss the power of a smile, a kind word, or yes even sharing a book with someone. We continue to read Rediscover Jesus as a parish. Our hope is it sparks a zest to walk more closely with Jesus. We invite you to share this book with someone or talk about a point that speaks to you. We have additional copies in the church if you never received one or know someone who could use the encouragement.

We have all been commissioned to be "the light" to our brothers and sisters around us. As Jesus said, in Matthew 28:19-20 "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you.*And behold, I am with you always, until the end of the age."

JUSTICE MATTERS

Over 400 people from 21 faith groups attended the Solutions Briefing on March 31. There was a proposal to add another issue to our agenda for the April 13 Nehemiah Action Assembly. A brief overview follows.

The evolution from "mental health" as a priority into research on criminal justice reform is the product of forces outside the control of Justice Matters. The Douglas County Commission unanimously agreed recently that the decision whether to fund the creation of a Mental Health Crisis Center and to expand the Douglas County jail will be packaged together as an "all or nothing" vote.

Justice Matters' Mental Health Research Committee has been investigating the proposed jail expansion ever since it became clear that the fate of the crisis center is connected to the jail.

At the Solutions Briefing network members voted overwhelmingly to add the priority of criminal justice reform to ensure safe and effective alternatives to incarceration are considered before the jail expansion plan is brought before the public for a vote. The overall goal is to not only end up with a "jail we can be proud of", but more importantly a "local criminal justice system that we can be proud of".

Justice Matters members believe this goal is similar to the aspirations of the County Commission and look forward to creating ballot language that accomplishes our mutual interests.

3er Domingo de Pascua

En este Tercer Domingo de Pascua el Evangelio nos presenta un cuadro de tres cosas importantes para reflexionar. La primera es una pesca milagrosa, segunda encontramos a Jesús preparando una comida para los discípulos y por último somos partícipes del diálogo entre Jesús y Pedro. La iniciativa de Jesús resucitado está basada en su amor por nosotros. La misión, la Eucaristía y el ministerio pastoral es reconocida por sus discípulos y dan su respuesta de inmediato. Reconocen al Señor por la fe y lanzan las redes de la obediencia a la derecha a lo opuesto de hacerlo siempre. "Echen la red a la derecha de la barca y encontrarán peces" (Jn 21, 6).

La enseñanza es clara, no podemos permanecer de pie solamente viendo lo que pasa a nuestro alrededor. Hay que trabajar, insistir hay que intentar una y otra vez. Cuando Dios actúa en nuestra vida nos unimos a su petición y acción. Además nos prepara la comida y nos invita. "Vengan a almorzar" (Jn 21, 12). Fijémonos que es él quien toma la iniciativa. Es él que nos da su cuerpo y su sangre en la Eucaristía. Su presencia lo cambia todo. Él es la luz, el amor, la vida nueva. Si lo reconocemos ya no podemos quedarnos quietos. ¡Hay que anunciarlo! Ojalá que en este domingo aprovechemos para vivir esta experiencia, como se vive en el Cursillo de Cristiandad el ágape. Amor vivo presente ante nosotros como lo estuvo con sus discípulos después de resucitar, aquel día de Pascua. Pidamos en esta celebración de la Eucaristía poder gozar de los dones que nos trae Cristo resucitado. Porque ¡amar a Cristo es apacentar a sus ovejas! ¿Lo haremos?

3er Domingo de Pascua

¡Qué hermosa es la Pascua! Es un tiempo donde el Espíritu Santo trabaja en su Iglesia, haciendo de nosotros testigos obedientes hasta el final. Nuestra tarea es como la de Pedro. O sea, una continua conversión por medio del diálogo de pregunta y respuesta entre Jesús y cada uno de nosotros. El Libro de los Hechos de los Apóstoles también nos ayuda a reflexionar en cómo los apóstoles, a pesar de no ser bien recibidos en Jerusalén, continuaron predicando a Cristo resucitado con la seguridad de que "Primero hay que obedecer a Dios y luego a los hombres". ¿Crees que en la sociedad actual hacemos lo mismo? ¿Qué concepto tenemos de la obediencia? Al obedecer buscamos incansablemente la voluntad de Dios en nuestra vida. Esto nos traerá por consecuencia la fidelidad al Evangelio.

San Juan nos ubica en otra historia pascual de Jesús. Si recordamos bien, la semana pasada se apareció Jesús a sus apóstoles en un cuarto donde estaban estos encerrados. Hoy se aparece a la orilla del lago donde algunos de ellos salieron a pescar. La clave de esta historia es la encomienda de Jesús a la misión del cuidado pastoral de las personas que se nos han encomendado: "sean mis testigos, sean fieles y obedezcan al Padre tal como yo lo he hecho". Como ejemplo tenemos a Pedro quien de traicionar al Señor pasó a ser la roca firme donde Cristo depositó su confianza. Dejemos que el Espíritu de Dios nos guíe, sabiendo que ya no iremos a donde nosotros queramos sino a donde Dios nos tiene determinado ir.

Kids: Sharing the Gospel

Love is dangerous. When you truly love someone, you are willing to sacrifice and go outside your normal boundaries of comfort. You never know what will be asked of you, but true love does not consider the cost of loving, it simply responds affirmatively to whatever the need.

When Jesus asks Peter several times about his love for him, he is clarifying that this is true love Peter has and not admiration or infatuation. This is because Peter's love of the Lord will end up costing him dearly. Love gives us life, but we also die somewhat when the source of that love suffers and passes away. But the good news of Jesus Christ is that those who love him will follow him in life, through death, and into a life that is eternal, even if before that heavenly banquet there will be many trials along the way.

The stewardship way of life demands of us a certain maturity of discipleship. Just as a child is not yet ready to be a parent, an immature disciple may not yet be ready to sacrifice regardless of the cost. So every day we are challenged and called to respond, sometimes even with little cost to ourselves. But each step, no matter how small, brings with it growth. We are growing not only in maturity, but in love as well.

When questioned, was Peter ready to accept the challenge regardless of the cost? His denial of Jesus after the arrest in the garden leads one to say no. But Peter grew wiser and more mature in faith, becoming the head of the church in Jerusalem and our first pope. If love can do this in Peter, what does love have in store for you? Be careful, because love that great is indeed dangerous.

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"Jesus said to him the third time, 'Simon, son of John, do you love me?'" Three times, Simon Peter had denied Jesus. Now, three times, the risen Christ gives Peter the opportunity to announce his love. Although Peter was "distressed" by the Lord's repeated question, ultimately this must have been a healing moment in Peter's life. He finally had the opportunity to assure Jesus that he loved him, thereby making up for his earlier failure and weakness on the night of the Crucifixion.

Jesus' death on the cross sufficed to forgive us of our sins. But his resurrection assures us that there is new life on the other side of our sinfulness. Just as Jesus had the power to conquer death, so too through his grace we have the power to conquer our sins. We can live a resurrected life, we can have a new beginning, just as Peter did that day at the Sea of Tiberias when he pledged his faith anew.

This pledge of faith, it's interesting to note, also came with a kind of commission. Each time that Peter told the Lord he loved him, Jesus responded with a command: "Feed my lambs," "Tend my sheep," and "Feed my sheep." Of course, we know that Jesus had already established Peter as the "rock" on which he built his church, as the first pope. Now, Jesus was emphasizing the connection between loving him--the Good Shepherd--and loving his people, his flock, his church. Peter's love for Christ was meant to be manifested in his love and care for the church, as is the case with every pope. But it's also true for every Christian. We are called not just to relish the gift of forgiveness and the grace of new life in Christ, but to take the next step of loving and serving those around us.

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Sharing the Gospel

After Jesus rose from the dead, he must have looked very different. Jesus helped his apostles catch a lot of fish, just as he had done before. Jesus invited his friends to eat with him, and he still broke his bread to share it in the same way he always had. The disciples still recognized Jesus by the things he did.

Prayer

Dear God, help me to always recognize Jesus.
