SOCIAL JUSTICE SOCIAL ACTION

Saint Nicholas of Myra (15 March, 270 – 6 December, 343)

The man we know as St. Nicholas (Nikalaos) of Myra was born in Patara, circa 270. Patara is in present-day Turkey but the region was Greek in culture and language at that time. Though we know him better in his modern incarnation as Santa Claus, he deserves to be considered for his enormous work on behalf of the poor, the sick, the suffering, and those in prison. Much about him is shrouded in legend but it is considered likely that the tales reflect the deeds and the high regard with which his contemporaries held him.

Nicholas was a pious youth from a wealthy family. He observed the canonical fasts on Wednesdays and Fridays. When his parents died in an epidemic, he was raised by his uncle who was bishop of Patara and, due to his exceptional piety, was ordained at a very young age. He was imprisoned and tortured during the persecutions of the Roman Emperor Diocletian. Following his release, he lived for a time at a small monastery in the Holy Land before becoming bishop of Myra, near modern-day Finike, Turkey.

Bishop Nicholas was quickly renowned for his generosity to the needy and his love of children. He was also known as a worker of miracles. One of his best-known legends concerns the gifts he rendered to a man with three daughters. The man could not provide dowries for any of his girls and unmarried women of that time were at risk of being forced into prostitution. On the morning when each daughter came of age, the man would find a purse of gold that had been flung into his house the night before. It was said that when the last daughter came of age, the bishop threw the sack of gold down the chimney and it fell into the girl's stocking which she had hung by the fire to dry. As the legend spread, it was said the bishop would deposit secret gifts for children in shoes rather than stockings.

Nicholas invariably took the side of the oppressed against the powerful. He interceded more than once on behalf of wrongly condemned prisoners. He organized relief during times of famine when the rulers were unable or unwilling. Thanks to life-saving miracles he wrought at sea, he was beloved of sailors. And his kindnesses were always undertaken as quietly as possible as he desired no personal recognition.

His impact on his world can be seen from the variety of professions and classes that have adopted him as their patron, apart from children and mariners: bankers, pawnbrokers, scholars, orphans, workers, travelers, judges, paupers, maidens, and many others, including murderers. Nicholas was deemed a saint before the Church initiated formal canonization procedures, circa 1000. His feast day is December 6th, which is the day he died in 343.

JUSTICE MATTERS

AN INTERFAITH NETWORK WORKING FOR JUSTICE IN LAWRENCE.

The Jail Alternatives Steering Committee from Justice Matters compiled a report called "Restorative Justice at Home: the case for safe, effective alternatives to jail expansion in Douglas County". On November 14, over 100 people representing 23 congregations as well as unchurched folks came together at Immanuel Lutheran Church to learn and listen to each other, persons of various races and life experience. These research groups are continuing the efforts of previous network members to address our four issues, voted upon at previous community problems assemblies: affordable housing, mental health concerns, criminal justice reform, childhood trauma and racism, our newest voted priority, which impacts most of the other issues.

The criminal justice reform and mental health committees have worked to postpone the referendum on the city's jail expansion project until safe, effective alternatives have been reviewed by the new Criminal Justice Coordinating Council. Another accomplishment of 2015 has been the inclusion of an expert on race issues who will serve on the Council. A new opportunity has been provided for team and network members to leaflet at the jail and speak with families of persons confined there. This activity helps to educate all of us as to the many financial and emotional stresses that affect persons in our jail system. We need more network members to assist us in this important work of advocating for prisoners and their families.

A new report, entitled "Restorative Justice at Home" has been compiled by the Lawrence Justice Matters coalition. It provides background on the cost and penalties associated with incarceration, especially upon families of victims. Besides the social stigma affecting employment, families experience tremendous financial expenses, lost educational opportunities, mental health challenges like depression and isolation from community members. This document recommends restructuring prison policies, reinvesting in substance abuse programs, and stable housing. Also, removing barriers to employment and human support systems. Savings from reforms could be allocated to job training and reentry skills for success in society. This report can be made available to parishioners by request from the Justice Matters team.

ONLINE GIVING RENEWAL PROCESS

How to renew your Online Giving account:

Thank you for generous support of St. John through the online giving program. There are some steps you will need to take in order to update your information in Online Giving for the coming pledge year. Each year these steps can be taken only if changes need to be made in the amount or the date that your tithe is withdrawn.

Steps to take:

1. Login to your ACCOUNT. You can find the Online Giving link on the St. John website home page www.sjevangelist.com. (If you need to find out your username or password check your junk mail when they send the email with that information)
2. Click on "My Active Online Giving" — This gives a list of all your active giving. Take a note of the gift type that you have clicked. (Pledge or Recurring)
 - A. If the "Gift type is Pledge" — Payments will end when that pledge amount is reached. You will need to go in and change that to a recurring gift. You can do that by clicking on "Give a New Gift" and enter as a recurring gift.
 - B. If the "Gift type is Recurring" — Payments will continue until you tell them to stop. If you wish to change the amount or the date which the payment is withdrawn you will do this from the "My Active Online Giving" screen (at the end of the line there is a little pencil, click on the pencil to change the amount and/or date).

La figura y mensaje central de este Segundo Domingo de Adviento es Juan Bautista.
