

# BREAD TO OFFER

## GIVING EVIDENCE OF OUR FAITH

“Is this the manner of fasting I would choose, a day to afflict oneself? To bow one’s head like a reed, and lie upon sackcloth and ashes? Is this what you call a fast, a day acceptable to the Lord? Is this not, rather, the fast that I choose: releasing those bound unjustly, untying the thongs of the yoke; setting free the oppressed, breaking off every yoke? Is it not sharing your bread with the hungry, bringing the afflicted and the homeless into your house; clothing the naked when you see them, and not turning your back on your own flesh: Then your light shall break forth like the dawn, and your wound shall quickly be healed; Your vindication shall go before you, and the glory of the Lord shall be your rear guard” (Isaiah 58:5-8).

These words from the prophet Isaiah are worthy of serious reflection as we continue on our journey of faith during this Year of Mercy. They prefigure the message of Jesus in the Gospel when at the last judgment, he says to those on his right, “Come, you who are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, a stranger and you welcomed me, naked and you clothed me, ill and you cared for me, in prison and you visited me” (Matthew 25:34-36).

St. John Parish has a wonderful array of ministries and services to those in need. So many of you are bringing relief to the hungry, the sick, the homebound, the homeless, the immigrant, the lonely, the hurting. As well, you are truly serving the Lord as you serve them. So many gifts of the Holy Spirit have been manifest in the variety of ways that you all serve.

At the 11:00 Mass this weekend we will be commissioning leaders for Justice Matters, a ministry which seeks to influence public policy and opinion regarding certain social structures in the city of Lawrence and in Douglas County, which inadvertently keep some individuals from having access to basic necessities, such as shelter, health care, employment, child safety, education, and financial stability. Justice Matters is a large organization of people from different faiths and Christian denominations who meet as a group or groups within their particular congregation. They pray and reflect together on ways to work for just government and social structures in order to help lighten the burden of those who for a host of causes, many of which are out of their control, are not able to receive basic services or assistance.

Not everyone has the gift of participating in this particular outreach/ministry of our parish. If, however, you think you may be called to serve the God’s people in this way, please see Justice Matters information in the bulletin and on our parish website. They will welcome you with great appreciation!

These words from the Letter of James are make a fitting conclusion to this Sunday’s Bread to Offer:

“What good is it, my brothers, if someone says he has faith but does not have works? Can that faith save him? If a brother or sister has nothing to wear and has no food for the day, and one of you says to them, ‘Go in peace, keep warm, and eat well,’ but you do not give them the necessities of the body, what good is it? So also faith of itself, if it does not have works is dead” (James 2:14-17).

# JUSTICE MATTERS

An interfaith network of 23 faith groups working for justice in Lawrence and Douglas County



You are Invited! You are invited to participate in one of the 6 Justice Matters' house meetings being held in St. John Parish beginning on October 2. These meetings are sacred conversations, held in confidence among those present. It is an opportunity to raise new issues that need to be addressed or to find other areas of those issues we are already working on to be explored.

At present, we have 6 team leaders: Jean Drumm, Ruth Entwistle, Pat Lechtenberg, Vicki McMurray, Joe Snyder with Marilyn Page, and Carol vonTersch. Our goal would be to invite all parishioners, but with only 6 of us extending invitations we will do miss a lot of people at St. John.

Doing justice may sound strange or new to you. I remember when Catholics, back in the 1970s, thought evangelization was a Protestant activity. There might be a similar reaction to 'doing justice'. To fully live out the two great commandments of loving God and loving neighbor we are called to 'do justice, love mercy and walk faithfully with God'. (Micah 6:8) In similar words in the gospel of Matthew 23:23-24 Jesus reminds us not to 'neglect the weightier matters of the law, justice, mercy and good faith'. We are a truly faithful people with lots of opportunities to worship and praise our God and to grow spiritually. We have multiple mercy ministries that see to the needs of our brothers and sisters. Where and how do we do justice in our parish? How can we change systems that are not fully mindful of basic human needs in Lawrence? Justice Matters is an opportunity to 'do justice'.

Doing justice is what loving your neighbor looks like in public. Please prayerfully consider being a good steward of 2 hours of your time and participate in a Justice Matters house meeting in October.

We hope to have 100 parishioners give input at the house meetings. If you are willing to host a conversation but aren't ready to make a commitment to be a team leader, please let us know. We can arrange to have another parish team leader facilitate that conversation. We want to be sure to have at least 10-15 participants in each home.



## MARRIAGE MINUTE

"Woe to the complacent!" Marriage experts all have their own theories about which "trouble spots" are most dangerous for couples. Is it communication problems, financial crisis, or the critical illness of a child? This week's readings take a different approach, suggesting that perhaps comfort is more dangerous than any of these things.

Relationships are dynamic. We are either moving toward one another, or away. A crisis, though certainly stressful, can have the effect of making couples focus on one another in order to face challenges together. The danger of ordinary times is that we can lose focus on one another, take one another for granted, and begin to drift apart without even noticing.

Here are some ideas for keeping marriage strong in "good times":

- Make short daily time together a habit (i.e. morning coffee before work, or do dishes together)
- Affirm your spouse daily
- Commit to annual marriage enrichment
- Schedule time with your spouse (and treat it like other important appointments)

# SOCIAL JUSTICE SOCIAL ACTION

We are in the throes of a very difficult election cycle. And I don't know about you, but I have not always handled my interactions concerning politics in ways that I've been happy about. I usually do OK, unless something in me gets triggered and I launch into a diatribe that I regret later.

Why does this happen? According to Brother Albert Merz, OFM, these things happen for a variety of reasons: Though we are all born with an inherent dignity we all share as human beings, we each are formed with a different cast of characters, e.g., people, institutions, events, in our lives and they, together with our reflections about this cast of characters, play a major part in shaping our world view and our behavior. Because we all have been shaped by a different cast of characters, none of us sees things the same way. Disagreements are bound to happen and how we handle these disagreements is key. We have the power to build good will or to destroy it.

Each of us filters information through the lens of our own life journey, which can be a major influence in determining how we view the world and how we communicate. It is helpful to begin any response to a difficult interaction with some reflective silence during which we do the mental and spiritual work on: "a) what is to be said; b) to whom it is to be said; c) how it is to be said; d) when it is to be said." "Our reflective response to these four questions will guide us in determining whether our communication will build or diminish relationships, whether it will benefit or hinder the common good."

We also must take care to talk with each other, rather than "at" or "to" each other, as this is a breeding ground for alienation which fuels incivility and seeds of violence in our conversations with each other. The roots of solutions to society's problems must be found in common ground, as difficult as finding that can seem.

Albert Merz offers the following help to us in the form of a FRANCIS pledge:

**Commitment to Civility in Discourse** (Using the Letters of the Name of Our Patron Saint Francis)

I commit to:

- **Facilitate** a forum for difficult discourse and acknowledge that all dialogue can lead to new insight and mutual understanding.
- **Respect** the dignity of all people, especially the dignity of those who hold an opposing view.
- **Audit** myself and utilize terms or a vocabulary of faith to unite or reconcile rather than divide conflicting positions.
- **Neutralize** inflamed conversations by presuming that those with whom we differ are acting in good faith.
- **Collaborate** with others and recognize that all human engagement is an opportunity to promote peace.
- **Identify** common ground such as similar values or concerns and utilize this as a foundation to build upon.
- **Support** efforts to clean up the provocative language by calling policymakers to their sense of personal integrity.

## 25 de septiembre de 2016

### 26° Domingo del Tiempo Ordinario

En este domingo como en el pasado el lenguaje de Amós suena claro y directo para las personas que disfrutaban de las comodidades de sus bienes materiales, sin pensar, mucho menos compartir, con los oprimidos. Recordemos que en tiempos del profeta Amós se vivían tiempos prósperos pero las riquezas las controlaban unos pocos. Por lo tanto la pobreza abundaba. A pesar de las circunstancias la voz del profeta anuncia esperanza --Dios actuará en favor de los oprimidos, los injustos recibirán las consecuencias de sus actos: "¡Ay de ustedes, los que se sienten seguros en Sión y los que ponen su confianza en el monte sagrado de Samaria!" (Am 6, 1). Este texto está basado en la destrucción de Samaria en el año 722 a.c. y a la deportación que se llevó a cabo.

Por consecuencia la parábola de hoy nos habla directamente a tomar una actitud de conversión. El poseer riquezas no es malo sino lo malo es el apego a ellas. Solo existen dos caminos, el que lleva a la vida y el que lleva a la perdición. Jesús lo explica mejor cuando hace mención de las bienaventuranzas. "Dichosos ustedes los pobres, porque de ustedes es el Reino de Dios" (Lc 6, 20). Y en el mismo pasaje nos dice. "Pero, ¡ay de ustedes, los ricos, porque ya tienen ahora su consuelo!" (Lc 6, 24). El Evangelio nos indica en todo momento el modo de vivir practicando la justicia, haciéndolo seremos misericordiosos. ¡Eso es lo que Dios espera de nosotros día a día! ¿A quién represento en mi vida, a Lázaro o al rico?

### 26° Domingo del Tiempo Ordinario

Todos nosotros al ver programas en la televisión nos damos cuenta de que existe una gran disparidad entre el glamour derrochado por algunas personas y la pobreza que enfrenta la gran mayoría en la sociedad a nivel global. Aparentemente somos modernos y avanzados en muchos aspectos. Pero en muchos otros actuamos salvajemente y nos portamos mal los unos con los otros. ¿Cómo describir a la sociedad de ahora? ¿Cómo adentrarnos en esta complejidad de proceder? ¿Cómo dejar de competir pensando siempre que somos los primeros? El profeta Amós en sus tiempos también tenía esa gran incógnita. El Reino de Israel se encontraba en bonanza y prosperidad. Pero la riqueza la tenían solamente unos cuantos mientras la pobreza abundaba. Por esa razón el profeta recorría las ciudades denunciando las injusticias sociales.

El Evangelio da comienzo con intensos contrastes, designando el estatus del rico y del pobre: el primero vestido con finas y costosas telas de esa época, y el segundo vestido de úlceras y yagas. Las suntuosas comidas diarias con amigos ricos contra la búsqueda de comida con el perro como único compañero. Esta parábola es rica en contrastes y nos ayuda a reflexionar para poder ver y escuchar lo que acontece a nuestro alrededor. Los pobres claman por justicia y reclaman lo que les pertenece: ¡vivir con dignidad de personas! Existen muchos Lázaros en el mundo que son reconocidos y amados por Dios. Nos toca, por lo tanto, orar a Jesús resucitado para que nos abra los ojos y podamos ver el sufrimiento de los demás y así esforzarnos en remediar sus necesidades. Recordar a la gente como Lázaro es siempre un recurso de gracia en nuestra vida. ¿Hemos entendido la parábola?
