LAYING A FIRM FOUNDATION **By Fr. Jeff Ernst, OFM, Cap.**

“And the rain descended, and the floods came, and the winds blew, and burst against that house; and yet it did not fall, for it had been founded upon the rock” (Matthew 7:25).

At the beginning of a New Year, it seems appropriate to begin the year by making sure that our faith foundation is firm. This includes our prayer and spiritual life. Our relationship with God requires effort in facilitating that relationship through a lively prayer life and by giving evidence of our faith through charitable works, service, and advocacy. More will be said about this as we approach Lent. In addition to a solid spiritual foundation in our life as a parish, is further establishing and strengthening a foundation for the future of St. John Parish and School. Specifically and more immediately, would be the building project and our parish/school budget.

As you have seen, the foundation for the convent has been constructed and is ready to receive the convent house this coming week. On Monday, work will begin to run girders and beams under the convent in preparation for the move. Axles and wheels also will be added to the understructure. It was explained to me that the move system will be operated with hydraulics, enabling the operator to “steer” the house and make leveling adjustments as the house is being towed by a truck or tugged by a winch. The house will be moved over top of the new foundation and gently lowered in place. It will then immediately be anchored to the foundation. Regarding the new gym, bids for construction were received this past week and we are now in the process of making a decision as to which contractor will be awarded the contract for construction. Presently, the grade in the area of the new gym is not stable enough to support a large structure such as a gym. Approximately 30 inches of grade will be removed from the entire area where the convent presently sits, including the north parking lot and some of the parking lot to the south of the convent. A more stable mixture of grade will replace the old, providing a firmer foundation upon which to build the gym. The purpose of all of this is to further enhance and strengthen the foundation of our parish mission – to serve the community, to provide for students from all over the region a place where they can play and compete in an environment of faith and charity. Our hope is that all who come to St. John, whether as a parishioner, student, visitor, or volunteer, will in some way experience the presence of God. Building a gym may not seem to have a direct affect on the Gospel mission of our parish. However, if we can attract people to come onto our campus, we are in a sense inviting them to encounter the Lord. Jesus said, “Let the little children come to me and do not hinder them in coming to me; for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these” (Matthew 19:14). It seems that this passage applies well to those children and students who might come from all over the region to play sports and to attend St. John School. Yet, it also applies to anyone who steps onto our campus because we are all children of God. It would seem, therefore, that the more we can facilitate and provide for events and activities here, the more we are allowing people to come to Jesus and to not hinder them.

Important to our ability to establish a firm foundation upon which to set a convent and a gym is the foundation upon which we steward our resources. If you have read our parish bulletin these past few weeks, you will have seen that our parish is running a rather large deficit budget. I first would like to remind everyone that a budget does not reflect actual spending and income. A budget is a projection of costs and income base on previous actual costs and income and on what we believe is needed to continue with our parish/school services and fiscal responsibilities. With regard to this year’s budget deficit, I have attempted in previous bulletins to explain to you the steps we are taking to mitigate that deficit. Among steps being taken, I have asked parish office staff to move to part time during the coming summer months. In addition, two staff positions will be moved to permanent part time positions. Our school staff is also making adjustments to help recover some of our parish deficit gap. Amazingly, up to this point, we have been able to pay our bills! One of the positive changes that has occurred this fiscal year is that your contributions to our weekly collection have increased to the point where, mid-way through the fiscal year, collections are over 50% of our budget projections – I am told that the parish has not been this far ahead in collections mid-fiscal year in a long time – congratulations to you all and Thank You! Obviously, this will help to narrow that deficit gap in our budget. There are a couple of other changes in the works to help balance our budget about which I will report later in the year when I have more information. I would like to thank my able staff and our parish finance council for their creative thinking and dedication. They do not like me to mention their names publicly, so I will use those general terms “staff” and “finance council.” And again, I want to thank all of YOU for your wonderful prayerful and loving support of your parish and school!

We have so much for which to be grateful in this New Year. We have such a dedicated, prayerful, and charity-oriented parish congregation – I am amazed and spiritually edified at what so many of you do with the time you give to God in prayer and retreats; the generosity you show with your contributions; and the way you allow God to work through you with your talents and your service to our parish and to those in need! In addition, we received a loan from the Archdiocese, which will enable us to move forward with the building project; we continue to receive random but significant monetary gifts in support of our school; Mrs. Newton and our teachers continue to lead our school with exemplary enthusiasm, dedication, and love; and our school enrollment is as high as it has ever been with right at 330 students! I do not consider myself to be a naturally gifted administrator, but God has provided you and I with a very talented and professional parish staff. I am truly grateful to God for this gift – without them, I could not do my job.

THE WORLD JESUS KNEW

A NEW CLASS FOR THE NEW YEAR WITH FR. BARNABAS!

In order to grow in one's understanding of Scripture one needs to know a bit about the historical context in which the scriptures were written. The better one knows the cultural customs, geography, people and places of the Holy Land at the time of Christ, the better one can understand the Lord's message and how it applies to us today. **Beginning January 24th at 7:00 p.m. in the church basement**, I will be offering an introductory class on the world that Jesus knew and in which he lived.

The class will cover such topics as the cultural ways Jesus followed, the festivals Jesus celebrated, the education Jesus received, the agricultural ways he observed, and the land he crossed. The class will also look at the different groups of people that existed in the Lord's day and their historical backgrounds. This will include, of course, the Sadducees, the Pharisees and the Zealots... Who are they? Where did they come from? And what is their importance?

A basic understanding of the political background and history of the Holy Land is also important when it comes to growing in love, knowledge, and application of Scripture as well. This class will introduce you to a bit of the history that formed and shaped the Holy Land of the Lord's day. We will cover the origins of King Herod and the history of the Jewish return from exile and the rebuilding of the Temple. This class is intended to be an introduction to the above topics so that you can read, understand, and then better apply the Scriptures to your own life and to the world around you.

We do that by fulfilling our scriptural imperatives to do justice, love mercy and walk humbly with God.

Bless your calendar by circling this date and guarding it so you can do your part to help bring justice to Lawrence. Tickets will be available from network members for the event. We will make every effort to contact all parishioners but contact information changes and some people aren't registered so if you don't receive a call you can contact us for tickets. We are aware that some people will need rides and we'll facilitate that in the best way we can. Please help us reach our goal of bringing 250 St. John supporters to the Nehemiah Action Assembly by joining the assembly on this date.

CLIMATE CHANGE AND RELIGION (PART 1)

The environment — and especially the subject of climate change — is one of the most polarizing topics in American politics. This fact is obvious and indisputable — but what is its root? Climate change is a threat to our sense of place and identity. It affects our way of life and expectations of the future. No wonder we avoid it. Most of us are similar, with slight leanings one way or the other. Studies suggest that generally, conservatives are used to a world that is just, fair and secure. That is the way the world works. It is conservative to have loyalty to your family, patriotism, sanctity, maturity and religion, but to frown on desecration of America's greatness. Global warming is contrary to this and so it is disregarded.

The human psyche naturally rebels against the idea of eventual disaster. Civilizations throughout history have marched blindly toward disaster because humans are wired to believe that tomorrow will be much like today. A world that is 3 degrees warmer, much less 7 or 9 degrees warmer would be a very different place and would challenge what it means to be human. Climate change believers generally see the reality of what we are trying to hold back as almost futile and hopeless, so we push it away.

For many Americans, the climate issue lacks proximity and concreteness. It's abstract, invisible, distant, unfamiliar, slow moving, and intergenerational. It is not caused by an external enemy. We interpret it in the way we choose (ideology A, B or C) leading us to overestimate what we believe to be the consensus. One of the essential life enhancing functions of denial is blotting out the inner wintry darkness; this Mordor-esque land of eco-anxiety, anger, despair, and depression. Creating doubt, disparaging scientists and mocking the media is a perverse fossil fuel industry strategy. And it works. In 2015, of the 170 climate change deniers in Congress, their comments fell into nine (9) general categories.

1. There is no consensus on climate change, there is still significant debate, science can't predict it (40)
2. A big scam, a manufactured controversy to control and redistribute the wealth. Al Gore invented it. (31)
3. Maybe there is climate change but there is no consensus that it is man-made climate change (29)
4. A natural warming cycle (22)
5. Faulty research, data was doctored (16)
6. EPA and Cap and Trade laws to curb this would destroy the economy (12)
7. There has been no change in 15-20 years (9)
8. They change their tune: first global cooling, then warming, then climate "change" (7)
9. There is big money to be made on this renewable energy bandwagon (4)

Of course, we now know that 97% of the world's climate scientists say it is real, that it is manmade, and that it will be much less costly to act now rather than later. The reality of global climate change is going to keep intruding on our fantasies. Climate change is tainted by its association with the environmental movement. Thus it is bundled among issues that define group loyalty. Only 5% of people are members of environmental organizations. But more than 70% still identify with a religious faith and 25% consider themselves evangelical Christians. Christians keep faith and climate change in two separate boxes; faith is special, climate change doesn't have the same personal luminous quality.

We should recognize that in a modern society, science is for the "how" and religion is for the "why." A phony division between science and religion has emerged in some sects. Some have called science a religion. And the problem secular activists have is; acceptance is assumed, as though through osmosis, by reading a book or watching a documentary. No conviction, no language of doubt, no defense against backsliding and denial, no mechanism for coping with grief, no community of belief. If the science of climate change really were a religion, it would be a wretched one, offering guilt and blame. What is missing is forgiveness - the power of God to forgive - leaving the door open for personal change.
