id you have a question? Yes, teacher, what about those things called angels? Are they real? How do they operate? Do they really have wings? Why do we need angels? What is their significance? These and other questions – just ask Father Barnabas and he will let you know the answers.

Many times over the last six years I would hear about the teaching of Fr.

Barnabas and how good at it he was. Many have heard him and many have learned from him. He is going to be missed: "And I know his adult classes will be missed." Another observation was: "He is a great teacher of the Bible. I have learned so much from his classes." Fr. Barnabas was always ready to teach, whether about ancient history or modern trends.



Fr. Barnabas has his own style of doing things. Some would use the word quirky: "He has a quirky sense of humor" or "He would say something quirky that would hit my funny bone and make me laugh." Whether this was in the context of teaching or counseling, his unique sense of humor did the trick.

He always had time for conversation, with those in prison, with those who happened to be near, with those who were hurting. One person observed: "I admired his dedication to his prison ministry." Another said: "Fr. Barnabas will always put aside his work to listen and give guidance." He made his conversations very consoling: "...he listened without judging, gave advice without being condescending, and always made me feel like my glass was more full then it was empty." Quite a testament!

There are many other stories – handball, wedding rehearsals, truck driving, etc., etc. All of which adds up to this summary which says: "Fr. Barnabas is one of a kind!" Thank you for being that one of a kind that has served St. John's over the last six years. May you be blessed in your new ministry!

THE GIVING OF TREASURE WHY ARE CATHOLICS REQUIRED TO GIVE MONEY TO THE CHURCH?

ffering money and other goods to God and the Church is, before all else, a statement of gratitude. We see this when we look at how our spiritual ancestors showed their gratitude to God for the gifts they had received (e.g. Genesis 14:18-20 and Genesis 28:16-22). One of the ways they offered thanks to God was through a practice called "tithing," in which 10 percent of a person's goods (crops, livestock, money, etc.) were given back to God.



Today, the practice of tithing — giving 10 percent — is still common in many Protestant communities, but it is not required for Catholics. Instead, the Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches us that, "The faithful also have the duty of providing for the material needs of the Church, each according to [their] own abilities" (no. 2043). This means that, although we are not bound to practice "tithing" in the traditional sense, we do share a responsibility to share our money or other resources with our parish communities. Like our spiritual ancestors, we give as a sign of our gratitude for the many gifts that God has given to us. Beyond this, we also share our resources with other Catholic organizations to help them finance their ministries, to continue and grow their outreach to the poor and the needy, and to provide just wages for their employees.

How much we give depends on our individual circumstances, but since we share a responsibility for the programs, outreach, and health of our parish communities and Catholic organizations, this question gives us a wonderful opportunity to ask some important questions about the quality of our giving and what our priorities are. Remember, we are only stewards of our time, talents, and treasures and as the First Letter of Peter reminds us, "As each one of you has received a gift, use it to serve one another as good stewards of God's varied graces" (4:10).



SOCIAL JUSTICE SOCIAL ACTION

love tapestries, not only because they are tactile, but also lack L because they are often so rich in color and design. I am fascinated by the myriad of possibilities that abound with the interwovenness (is that a word?) of threads and fabric pieces. And so, I find, it is with ministry. Ministries have touch-points, points of intersection and lines of interweaving with each other. This interweaving, I believe, provides enrichment for the church. And when ministries collaborate, they create power in numbers; there is growth in the life of the church and with that, often growth in numbers. This is one reason why the social concerns for peace and justice ministry is reaching out to help, support and be a catalyst for other ministries with whom we connect. One of those ministries is the Justice Matters ministry, and we are excited about enriching and growing our connection with them to create a more just community in Lawrence in collaboration with a number of other local churches. That is why we have over the last several years supported Family Promise, which, through providing works of mercy and advocacy, have gown to connect with another of other programs in the community to grow justice in the work toward creating affordable housing for all in our community. That is why we support the committee for the inclusion of people with disabilities, a relatively new committee here in our parish who, through creating a more comfortable worship environment, will create justice toward people with disabilities in our parish, which will serve as a help for other parishes to also create more justice

in their parishes and communities for persons with disabilities. Such sharing of parish advocates is already happening on the archdiocesan level, as we all inspire one another with ideas and strategies for action. That is why we support the new Interfaith Mental Health Outreach program which will be starting soon here and in other local churches. In providing mercy for people who need help connecting with appropriate help, we can raise awareness and help support advocacy causes that advocate for the need for increased and improved mental health services and programs. Throughout all this, I'm referring to relationships. In this work in ministerial collaboration within the church and outward into the community, relationships are formed and through the work made possible by those relationships, change and growth are formed. And that's how it's been since the beginning of time. Look again at Exodus; at Nehemiah; at Isaiah. Time after time you will find examples of collaboration through relationship, and examples of how growth and change develop from those relationships. You will also see how when things go wrong, other collaborations and other relationships are built to right the situation. And so it goes throughout our Christian history. Each age brings with it new layer(s) of labels and sophistication and new concepts, some of which are very much like old ones, and some of which are newly packaged and presented in such a way that they may renew our work and how we do that work.

So let's move forward in creating justice. Let us move forward in that work with the anticipation and desire of building new relationships that bring renewal and creativity into our lives and justice into our church, community and world!

SAFE ENVIRONMENT PROGRAM - ADULT TRAINING (VIRTUS) EFFECTIVE IMMEDIATELY Excellence Builds Trust

In light of the current health conditions, one prudent and preventative measure we are taking is to make the VIRTUS Protecting God's Children for Adults training available Online as an option. Effective immediately, due to COVID-19, the Archdiocesan requirement for attending a VIRTUS Protecting God's Children for Adults workshop live session will be suspended and the option of the online version of the module can be offered in lieu of live training. This is a temporary safety precaution, and

parishes may still offer the live training session available as an option if they prefer as long as the local county and state ordinances in effect at the time of the event are followed. Please note, the training must still be completed prior to participants working around youth, but the requirement may now temporarily be met by completing the online Protecting God's Children module. Individuals needing to attend a session will be offered the option of the online module at the time of registration. They will still need to follow the background screening and policy completion process at the time of registration. Individuals who are already currently registered for an upcoming live session, may log back into their account and change to the online module. ANNOUNCEMENT OF AWARD. AND AN OPPORTUNITY TO PRESERVE HISTORY

In 2006, a historian from Watkins Museum interviewed several St. John parishioners who had grown up in La Yarda, the Mexican-American community located in East Lawrence during the first half of the 20th century. The interviews were recorded on cassette tape and VHS tape. Recently, St. John's was awarded a generous grant to digitize these tapes and transcribe them. The grant was awarded to us by the Douglas County Natural & Cultural Heritage Grant Program, through the Douglas County Heritage Conservation Council. This grant program strives to "secure the benefits of our heritage for present and future generations."

This month, the tapes were professionally digitized, and today a certified transcriptionist has begun making written copies of the interviews. Eventually, the transcriptions will need to be proofread, hopefully by someone who is familiar with the La Yarda families.

Our grant money budgets for proofreaders to read through the transcripts as they become available, and make corrections. This is an excellent opportunity for a parishioner who is familiar with the La Yarda families and who can make corrections on a printed copy while listening to a tape recording.
