FOCUS ON THE WORD

ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE 4th Sunday of Easter

Any builder worth his or her salt knows the value and importance of a cornerstone. Properly laying and securing this primary unit determines how the rest of the project unfolds and its success. Cornerstones are necessary elements not only of buildings but of lives as well. Many human beings conduct the business of their lives paying little attention to a grounding reference or starting point. Hence, what unfolds is a tapestry of relativism, with few anchors or guideposts and many impulsive choices. Some consider love to be their cornerstone. While this may sound attractive and useful, the pursuit of love without a simultaneous pursuit of its source can be shallow and selffocused. Just because a person chooses to do no harm and love others does not mean that they are living in truth and properly anchored to the real cornerstone.

Jesus is the true and authentic cornerstone and shepherd. It is only in following the Risen One as the way, the truth, and the life that we can move from being well grounded ethical people to properly focused moral ones. Proper conduct, a true sense of justice, wisdom, virtue, moral principles, faith, hope, and love will be difficult to find unless we listen to the right Voice. It is when we learn to listen to the voice of God that we begin our journey on the road to salvation. It is only the Good Shepherd, the authentic and solid cornerstone, who can guide us through life's questions and challenges and bring us to the safe and proper pasture.

A person's life only has meaning when the cornerstone is

properly selected and set. Understanding themselves only as random acts of creation, existing without intent or purpose, will color their choices and influence their decisions. The foundation of their lives will be simply a matter of preference and choice, leaving benchmarks of growth and higher ideals optional to pursue. Whereas people who believe that they are fashioned and loved into existence by a God who purposely made them, have this incredible unconditional relationship at their source which has tremendous significance. Their allegiance is not to themselves but to their Creator. Life, then, is an adventure in search of this Creator God and a journey of self-discovery that seeks to unite their will to His. There is a cost. We have to give up our life in order to gain our life. As ironic as that sounds, it is true. It is only when we finally figure this out that the true cornerstone of our lives will be properly laid and we can, with God's help, get about the business of properly constructing a temple that endures. ©LPi

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP -RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS Confidence in Princes


Have you ever confided your problems to a friend, only to get the answer, "have you prayed about it as much as you've talked about it?"

ARCHDIOCESE THOUGHTS

IT'S SO SIMPLE A CHILD CAN DO IT April 16, 2021

Incredibly, this Friday will be 136. At the end of the month, the total will climb to 465.

Those numbers refer to items that I've tossed, or will toss, out of my home. The concept is simple: On the first day of the month, toss out one item; on the second, two items; and on the third, three. Continue like that until the end of the month.

I started this project on a very auspicious date: April 1 (no foolin'). That was Holy Thursday, and I've been tossing ever since. It's both humbling and jarring to realize that there are that many individual things in my home that I don't need, use or love. And "tossing" doesn't necessarily mean throwing it in the trash. I have boxes and plastic bags holding things to be donated to charity.

If I, as a single person, have accumulated so much, I can't imagine what it would be like for families. And the consequence of all this stuff is seen in this little story: A man went searching for the meaning of life. After several years and many miles, he came to the hut of a holy hermit and asked for enlightenment. The holy woman invited the visitor into her humble dwelling and began to serve him tea. She filled the pilgrim's cup and then kept on pouring so that the tea was soon dripping onto the floor. The visitor watched the overflow until he could no

longer restrain himself. "Stop!" he cried. "It's full! No more will go in."

"Like this cup," said the hermit, "you are full of your own opinions, perceptions, ideas and possessions. How can I teach you unless you first empty your cup?" (Story adapted from one in Paul J. Wharton's "Stories and Parables for Preachers and Teachers.") This is probably what the early Christians experienced in the Acts of the Apostles: "No one claimed that any of his possessions was his own.... There was no needy person among them, for those who owned property or houses would sell them, bring the proceeds of the sale and put them at the feet of the Apostles, and they were distributed to each according to need" (4:32; 34-35).

My tossing project has definitely been fun, freeing... and a bit scary. If you're doubtful you could find such a large number of "tossable" possessions in your home, start by emptying your junk drawer. (Don't be ashamed; we all have them.) When I did, two questions constantly emerged: "What the heck is this thing?" and "Why am I holding on to it?" I bid goodbye to small packets of ketchup, mustard and sauces from fast-food joints. (Each of those counted for one item tossed!) I recycled carryout menus (you can easily find those online now) and instructions for equipment I no longer own.

There were dead batteries, Velcro strips, extension cords, tools and a whole host of other things. Some items just needed to go to their proper home; most others found their way to another home. And if you add in expired food in your refrigerator or pantry, books and magazines that you've read or never will, dried up pens and markers, you can see how easily you can get rid of hundreds of items in your home.

It honestly is freeing. There's more room, more time for important things, less to dust and less to store. And it's a great way to pray. When I'm tempted to give up or skip a day, I ponder this little poem from an unknown author:

"Go give to the needy sweet charity's bread./ For giving is living," the angel said./ "And must I be giving again and again?"/ My peevish, petulant answer ran./ "Oh, no," said the angel, piercing me through,/ "Just give till the Master stops giving to you."

Message received, loud and clear!

SOCIAL JUSTICE SOCIAL ACTION

The harvest of justice is sown in peace for those who cultivate peace. James 3:18

An article on the Pax Christi website by Kathy Kelly discusses a raid that took place several years ago in Yemen where the United States was supporting the Saudi Arabian intervention in that country's civil war. The operation, which was designed to capture an Al Qaeda leader, ended tragically. One of the Navy Seals was killed at the start. "In the ensuing battle, the U.S. forces called for air support. U.S. helicopter gunships arrived and...started indiscriminately firing missiles into huts." At least 15 civilians were killed in the raid according to Mwatana, a Yemeni human rights group.

The Church has been constant in Her calls for the international community to bring the conflict to an end through pressure and withdrawal of support for the competing factions. In 2018, Most Rev. Timothy P. Broglio, Archbishop for the Military Services USA, wrote in a letter to Congress, "The international community seems to be in agreement that this conflict, 'made by men,' can also be resolved by a concerted effort on the part of people of good will everywhere. Allowing this purposeless struggle to continue would represent an abdication of the responsibility to be peace makers."

The United States Bishops Conference of Catholic Bishops has made explicit that peacemaking is a life issue: "Part of the legacy of The Challenge of Peace (1983) is the call to strengthen peacemaking as an essential dimension of our faith, reminding us that Jesus called us to be peacemakers. Our biblical heritage and our body of tradition make the vocation of peacemaking mandatory."

The story of one small raid, carried out with one clearly defined objective, shows how easily warfare can spin out of control and impact so many lives unnecessarily. However honorable and well trained the soldiers, however worthy the intentions, once unleashed, war takes on a life of its own. As individual citizens and Christians, we are called on to advocate for peace, to learn more about the impediments to peace, and to challenge our elected leaders of either party to be serious about making peace. It is easy to ignore conflicts far from home but the Bishops are clear about our responsibilities:

"In a world where 40,000 children die every day from hunger and its consequences; where ethnic cleansing and systematic rape are used as weapons of war; and where people are still denied life, dignity and fundamental rights, we cannot remain silent or indifferent."

Billions of Federal Dollars for Homelessness & Local Initiatives Report on research from the Justice Matters Homelessness Research to Action Group

This week, we met with policy experts from the National Coalition to End Homelessness and the Center for Community Change to understand COVID-19 Relief and Stimulus funding in the pipeline. We learned there is an unprecedented opportunity to end homelessness, if we seize it. ADDRESS HOMELESSNESS (explicitly) \$1,641,383 dedicated to Lawrence directly \$22,929,650 more at state discretion DIRECT RENTAL ASSISTANCE (including those experiencing homelessness) \$46 BILLION nationally (local & state amounts TBD) EXPAND VOUCHERS for LONG-TERM HOUSING \$5 BILLION nationally (local & state amounts TBD) LOCAL PRIORITIES (discretionary spending) \$18.91 million dedicated to Lawrence \$23.71 million dedicated to Douglas County HUD BALANCE on CARES ACT (discretionary spending for housing) Estimated at ½ Billion in leftover funding for Kansas
