

# **SOCIAL JUSTICE SOCIAL ACTION**

Social Concerns for Peace and Justice Committee.

Last week, we introduced you to some of Paul Loeb's book, THE SOUL OF A CITIZEN. This week, we're sharing an excerpt from Chapter two. Don't worry if you missed last week's excerpt. His writing style is such that you don't have to have read prior content.

#### CHAPTER TWO: WE DON'T HAVE TO BE SAINTS

I believe many of us want to pursue something more than relentless self-interest—what Thomas Moore calls "a national persona of hype, ambition, narcissism, and materialism." We would like to find ways to connect with each other, express our compassion, and experience a sense of purpose impossible to at-tain through private pursuits alone. When we don't find ways to voice this larger self, our most generous impulses have nowhere to go.

Chief among the obstacles to acting on these impulses is the mistaken belief that anyone who takes a committed public stand, or at least an effective one, has to be a larger-than-life figure—someone with more time, energy, courage, vision, or knowledge than a normal person could ever possess. As we've seen with Rosa Parks, even our most noted historic figures often started their involvement in modest ways, and had as many failures as successes. Gandhi's grandson, Arun Gandhi, tells the story of how his grandfather's family mortgaged everything they had—their land, their jewelry, everything of value—to send Gandhi to law school. Gandhi graduated and passed the bar, but was so shy that when he stood up in court all he could do was stammer. He couldn't get a sentence out in defense of his clients. As a result, he lost every one of his cases.

He was a total failure as a lawyer. His family didn't know what to do. Finally, they sent him off to South Africa, where he literally and metaphorically found his voice by challenging the country's racial segregation.

I like viewing Gandhi not as the master strategist of social change that he later became, but as someone who at first was literally tongue-tied—shyer and more intimidated than almost anyone we can imagine. Given where he ended up on his subsequent journey, who knows what might be possible for the rest of us.

But most of us never get the chance to be inspired by the stories of those who've acted for change—because we don't encounter them. For too many of us, the past is a foreign country. The very stories that might remind us of our potential impact and strength are ignored, caricatured, or otherwise dismissed by our cultural gatekeepers. As a result, apart from a handful of famous names largely detached from their contexts, most of us know next to nothing of how ordinary men and women have fought to preserve freedom, expand the sphere of democracy, and create a more just society. Of the abolitionist and civil rights movements, we at best recall a few key leaders—and often, as with Rosa Parks, we don't know their actual stories. We know even less about the turn-of-thecentury populists who challenged entrenched economic interests and fought for a "co-operative commonwealth." These days, who can describe how the union movement ended eighty-hour workweeks at near-starvation wages? Who knows about the citizen efforts that first pushed through Social Security? How did the women's suffrage movement spread to hundreds of communities, and gather enough strength to prevail?

#### MEDITACIÓN DEL EVANGELIO

A Estamos en momentos difíciles de la historia. Mucha gente murmura y se pregunta: ¿Cuándo terminará la pesadilla de la pandemia? ¿Dónde está Dios en todo esto que estamos viviendo? Vivió algo similar el pueblo de Israel que caminaba en el desierto, también sentía la angustia de saber dónde estaría Dios en su experiencia de jornada, después de su salida de Egipto. Ellos basaban su realidad en el hambre, pues recordaban las ollas de carne y de comer pan hasta saciarse. Con todo esto, Dios dijo a Moisés: "He oído las quejas de mi pueblo. 
# **FOCUS ON THE WORD**

## **GOSPEL MEDITATION**

## 18th Sunday in Ordinary Time

"You cannot see the forest for the trees" is a widely known saying that can bring wisdom to our understanding of our journey. Often, our sight becomes limited to what is immediately before us. We lose touch with lessons and experiences from the past and promises and hope for the future. As human beings, we have the privilege of being able to choose things. What I like and don't like, want, and don't want can be major preoccupations of our minds and hearts. Our preferences and desires begin to define us more than the simple fact of our being. Who we are matters more than what we are or what we have. If we don't move beyond the external and superficial stuff to what really is of essence, we risk becoming very unsettled, disorientated, angry, and unhappy. We fail to see the bigger picture of hope and promise that lies ahead and the Divine Presence that has sustained and carried us before.

We like it when the "now" time of our lives satisfy us. Even the people who witnessed Jesus feed the five thousand got confused and distracted. It felt good when thousands of people were able to eat. They wanted to know what they could do to get this to happen again! But Jesus quickly reminds them that this is not the point of this sign. As much as the now time of our lives is of concern, it is not what is ultimately important. We need to learn the difference between being and doing, drawing more strength from who we are and who God is rather than what is happening around us and the choices we can make. Jesus is the true bread that came down from heaven. Jesus is the very incarnate presence of God who sustains life and assures us that we will not perish. This is not easy to understand and feel. We have to practice being in the presence of ourselves, others, creation, and God. We are brought to a holy place when



we encounter the sacredness of being. This is real prayer.

Then, we learn to trust. It is when we cease trusting that we start to become afraid, uncertain, apprehensive, and doubtful, and overly self-concerned. We even start to grumble. God has our back. That is the essential powerful message of the living bread come down from heaven. God, who is alpha is also omega, the beginning and the end, and has everything in between in his care as well. A woman once remarked that her most powerful God moment happened when she and her husband cuddled with their new baby for a time. Without exchanging words and using only the affection communicated through sight and touch, they rested in being with each other. This brought them to the sacred, where they realized that a greater Being was with them. It was real. They knew that they were part of something bigger, intimate, and profound. When we rest in the Living Source of life, we will find that our souls are no longer hungry or thirsty.

## **EVERYDAY REFLECTION**

### **Practicing Graciousness in the Desert**

I made their toast the way they like it, let them play in the park an extra ten minutes, or let them go to the movies with their friends and I finished up the chores on my own. And then, it happened: the attitude. The request for the smallest thing from one of them is met with disdain or bewilderment.

Sometimes you can be made breathless with the ingratitude of another person who takes so much and with so little shame, only to scoff at the idea that they, too, give even the smallest amount.

But if we're being honest with ourselves, we will admit that we do the exact same thing to God. Haven't we all been the Israelites in the desert at one point or another? God has parted our Red Sea in some way. He's led us out of some great trial, given us some great blessings. But then we run into a little resistance somewhere along the way and we throw up our hands. How could you do this to us, Lord? How could you ask this of us? No, I can't go any further. No, I won't do any more.

Persisting in the blindness to the many ways God continues to protect us is nothing short of a temper tantrum. It robs our Everyday Stewardship of its graciousness, of our ability to accept with joy the trials of life because we are also constantly aware of its blessings.



# JESUS CALLS OUR FAITH INTO QUESTION

JULY 2, 2021

You've probably heard the following Scripture passage countless times, but never like this:

Jesus, in the region of Caesarea Philippi, asked his disciples, "Who do people say that the Son of Man is?"

They replied, "Some say John the Baptist, others Elijah, still others Jeremiah or one of the prophets."

Jesus said to them, "But who do you say that I am?"

Peter replied, "You are the eschatological manifestation of a transcendent reality." And Jesus said, "What?!?"

So, who is this Jesus anyway? Last month, I was finally able to attend some live, in-person theater productions — something snuffed out by the pandemic for over a year. It was fitting, I suppose, that two of those shows dealt with Jesus.

The first, called "Jesus," was at the Sight & Sound Theatre in Branson, Missouri. The sets were massive and gave the audience a sensation of being in the places where Jesus walked, seeing the inhabitants in authentic attire. The storm at sea was so realistic that my stomach got queasy as the waves battered the boat.

Oh, did I mention the real camels? They were not only on stage, but moseyed through the audience as well. I also can't forget the Roman soldiers mounted on their live horses clomping down the aisles.

And, when Jesus cleared the Temple, live sheep and goats scampered through the theater. There was even an angel with about a six-foot wingspan who floated over the audience on a wire right before the Resurrection.

In this production, Jesus was presented as "the love that rescues." He freed people from sin, doubt, disease and death. The show emphasized the divinity of Jesus, his almighty power and wisdom.

The second show was completely different. This was a 50-year anniversary production at Starlight Theatre in Kansas City, Missouri. Here, the musicians were ringed around the back of the stage. The set consisted only of a towering scaffold and large alphabet blocks that spelled out the name of the show: G-O-D-S-P-E-L-L. This has always been one of my favorite shows with many songs that I know by heart and love.

For those unfamiliar with "Godspell," the cast is attired in crazy, multicolored,

unmatched outfits. The humanity of Jesus is emphasized in this production, and he's presented as a dear friend and captivating storvteller.

It's amusing to see how the cast members act out the various parables that Jesus tells, often with exaggerated props and slapstick antics. The parables and teachings of Jesus are not ridiculed, but rather are "pictured" in an unforgettable way. Most appealing to me is that Jesus here is shown as a person who radiates the joy of faith.

So, which of these shows presents the one, true picture of Jesus? I'd say the answer is: neither . . . and both! Let me explain: Just as each Gospel gives us a particular vision of Jesus, but not a complete one, so, too, do each of these shows. Although we get a glimpse of who Jesus is, we can never comprehend him fully. The British writer Evelyn Underhill says it best: "If God were small enough to be understood, he would not be big enough to be worshiped." In your travels this summer, look for opportunities to examine who Jesus is to you. Explore various depictions of Jesus —

books. No matter how you picture the Lord, however, there is one constant in our faith, beautifully captured in this memorable song from "Godspell": "Day by day, day by day, Oh dear Lord, three things I pray: to see thee more clearly, love thee more dearly, follow thee more nearly, day by day by day by day."






