SOCIAL JUSTICE SOCIAL ACTION

Social Concerns for Peace and Justice Committee,

What follows is a reflection on the common good by Fr. Steve Kluge, OFM. At the end, he invites us to reflect personally on some questions to help us in our spiritual pilgrimage toward peace and justice.

The Common Good

Society must be so ordered or arranged that it permits all people to reach their full human potential and to realize their God-given human dignity. Essential elements of the common good are: respect for the person, the social well being and development of the group, and peace and security for all.

Too often public policy is so ordered to give that have much, more, while those who have little are ignored or even deprived of the help the need in order to survive.

The incarnation of Christ shows us that reaching our full human potential is not about the acquisition of things or having a large bank account. Rather it is about loisng one's life by imitating the life of Christ and how he related to people through acts of generousity, hospitality and forgiveness. In the Eucharist, our lives are to image the breaking open of the eucharistic bread and the pouring out of the Eucharist wine.

We eat the body and blood of Christ so as to become his body and blood in the world. Pope Benedict XVI reminded us "a Eucharist which does not pass over into the concrete practice of love is intrinsically fragmented.:

QUESTIONS

Meditate on these words from the consecration at Mass, "Do this in memory of me ..." with the understanding that the word "this" means more than the ritual action done at Mass. What needs to change within society and the church so that everyone might reach their full human potential and dignity?

How would you define full human potential?

How do the effects of teh Eucharist show forth in your words and deeds during the week?

God through the spirit gives each of us gifts to be used in building up the body of Christ. What gifts has God given you? Are you using them or hiding them? How or why not?

If everyone who is church used their gifts to glorify God through ministering to him in service to the poor, how would that change the church? Society?

FOCUS ON THE WORD

GOSPEL MEDITATION

15th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Maybe the work is best left to the professionals. That's how many people view the preaching of the Gospel. That's the stuff priests, religious, deacons, lay ministers, and other professional Church people do. It has little to do with me. Well, that's not really true. The fact of the matter is that preaching the Gospel has everything to do with you, with all of us who are baptized members of the Body of Christ. Nobody gets off the hook from that job. The question is, however, how do we do it? Well, there's a safe way, which many choose, to preach the Gospel—and the risky way. The safe way pretty much keeps the Gospel in church and around like-minded people. I say my prayers, go to Mass, contribute to the food pantry, tithe, and attend Bible Study. That pretty much covers the bases, right? Wrong.

The risky way is the more challenging way and for many, the "road less traveled." Imagine those first disciples going out and into people's homes. They must have had some amazing conversations with folks about God's kingdom, changing their hearts, forgiving sins, and looking at the world differently. They must have met people who were hurting, exiled from their communities, neglected, lost, or living self-insulated lives in a society that served the rich and neglected the poor. While there were many who welcomed what they had to say and the conversations they had, there were others who no doubt rejected them and literally tossed them out on their ears! The Gospel, while being a message of joy and hope, is not always received well by those who are very comfortable keeping things as they are.

The risky way involves example and conversation. We have to take the Gospel from church and carry it with us wherever we



go. What kinds of conversations do we have with others? We interact with those closest to us, in our work, social circles, institutions, corporations, in politics, and beyond. Our conversations with others reveal a great deal about how we see things and what we consider important. If we are really interested in seeing God's vision for the world succeed, then we will talk about it. It will become a part of our everyday conversation and find its way into our interactions with others. How will we preserve the dignity of human life and encourage others to have a relationship with God? We must be the example, live value centered, virtuous lives, stand against injustice, combating racism, and learn ways to resolve conflicts without violence.

If we are going to succeed going forward, we have to find a way to bring our prayer centered lives into the marketplace. Our conversations have to change. Not everyone wants to hear what the Gospel has to say. That's a risk God asks us to take. ©LPi

EVERYDAY REFLECTION

What We Carry from Town to Town

In my experience, there are two kinds of people: the folks who kick off their shoes the second they walk through the door, and the ones who don't.

People can feel strongly about this on both sides. The main thrust of the Shoes-Off Brigade seems to be this: we track a lot of weird stuff on the soles of our feet. Little reminders of all the places we've been — whether it's a private home or a public bathroom — cling to our shoes long after we leave.

This same theory applies to our spiritual lives. As human beings and as disciples, we visit a lot of figurative towns and pick up a lot of figurative dust. Sinfulness. Shame. Defeat. Anger. Fear.

Doubt. No matter how hard we try to keep free of it, these things have a way of attaching themselves to us, sometimes without us even noticing. We need to take a good look at what unhelpful and unconstructive baggage from our past we're tracking into our present and future encounters.

What is the "town" God is asking you to visit today in His name? Is it a tough conversation with a friend, a brief witness to a stranger in the checkout line, a call to be present to someone in your family? Before you go, remember, shake off the dust. Don't let a past disappointment constrain you. Don't allow yesterday's failures or burdens to keep you from the joy of today's witness, whatever form it might take.

ARCHDIOCESE THOUGHTS

THEY COULD NOT LEAVE THEM ORPHANED JUNE 4, 2021

The older I get, the more appreciative I become of my family. Growing up, I assumed that everyone had loving parents and a stable home where the necessities of life — like faith, food, education and medical care — were provided for.

Obviously, that's not the case, as I've learned over the years and as recent articles in The Leaven about foster care clearly show.

Sadly, the plight of children in need is not a new one in our country. A few weeks ago, I visited the National Orphan Train Complex in Concordia (orphantraindepot.org). I suspect that many people are unaware of what the "orphan train" was or that this gem of a museum is found here in Kansas.

First, here's a little history lesson. Around the year 1830, the problem of homeless children exploded in large cities in the East. For example, the population of New York City by 1850 was about a half a million. Of those, about 10,000 to 30,000 children lived on the streets or were housed in overcrowded orphanages. These kids sold rags or matches to survive, while others engaged in prostitution or became thieves or pickpockets. At night, they slept on sidewalk steam grates or under bridges.

A minister and social reformer named

Charles Loring Brace was so disturbed by this situation that he founded the Children's Aid Society in 1853 to help children who were orphaned, half-orphaned or abandoned. He came up with the idea to rehome children from the slums of New York City to "goodhearted families in small towns and on farms [that] would take the children, educate them and see that they had a religious upbringing." This became "the largest children's migration in history," according to Andrea Warren in her book, "We Rode the Orphan Trains."

From 1854-1930, about 250,000 children rode those trains, with some 4100 children settling here in Kansas. Unfortunately, the children were not usually informed about what exactly was happening to them. Many, believing the train ride was an adventure, were simply excited to receive two sets of new clothes (one for the train ride and one to be changed into when meeting their new families) and a Bible. Agents from the Children's Aid Society traveled with the kids to provide food, medicines and emotional support.

In 1869, the Sisters of Charity of New York got involved. Sister Mary Irene Fitzgibbon and two other Sisters created the Foundling Hospital in New York City, where they cared for abandoned infants and toddlers. The Sisters "put a cradle in a protected area near the front door where infants could be left." Some people provided no information about the child, while others wrote emotional notes such as: "It is a heartbroken mother who is compelled to surrender her child through misfortune." And "My wife, its mother, is dead. Do the very best you can do for my little one." The Sisters placed their charges aboard "mercy trains" to live with Catholic families across the country.

The Concordia museum has a short film to introduce visitors to the story of the orphan trains. Afterwards, people can check out scores of photos, stories and artifacts of kids who rode those trains. There is even a refurbished rail car on-site to simulate what the children experienced.

Naturally, not every child found a happy home, but the majority of placements worked out well. Warren's book summarizes well the rationale behind the orphan trains: "Officials knew that the placing out program was imperfect and did what they could to screen out inappropriate families. But in spite of problems, placing out provided the best chance many of the children had of finding a home."

This day trip is a worthwhile stop ... especially if you've been taking your family for granted.
