

## SAFE ENVIRONMENT PROGRAM - ADULT TRAINING (VIRTUS)

In light of the current health conditions, one prudent and preventative measure we are taking is to make the VIRTUS Protecting

God's Children for Adults training available Online as an option. Effective immediately, due to COVID-19, the Archdiocesan requirement for attending a VIRTUS Protecting God's Children for Adults workshop live session will be suspended and the option of the online version of the module can be offered in lieu of live training. This is a temporary safety precaution, and parishes may still offer the live training session available as an option if they prefer as long as the local county and state ordinances in effect at the time of the event are followed. Please note, the training must still be completed prior to participants working around youth, but the requirement may now temporarily be met by completing the online Protecting God's Children module. Individuals needing to attend a session will be offered the option of the online module



at the time of registration. They will still need to follow the background screening and policy completion process at the time of registration. Individuals who are already currently registered for an upcoming live session, may log back into their account and change to the online module. These procedures will be reviewed and updated periodically as needed and are in place to protect you, those you work with, and your family. ## CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

## Is gossip a mortal sin?

To really ask this question, we must consider the Eighth Commandment: "You shall not bear false witness." In its reflections on this commandment, The Catechism of the Catholic Church invites us to not only think about what bearing "false witness" means, but to also consider how we understand the truth and how we communicate more broadly. This is why so much of this section of the Catechism has to do with the gift of language. With this in mind, we will notice that the word "gossip" isn't used by the Catechism. Instead, we find the words "detraction" and "calumny," which are actually two forms that gossip can take, and both can be quite serious. First, detraction is the of revealing "another's faults and failings to persons who did not know them," without morally valid reasons. Calumny, by extension, is saying something about another person that is untrue, and it is sinful because it "harms the reputation of others and gives occasion for false judgements" (see no. 2477).

In all of our communication, we have to always recognize that we have a moral obligation to the truth and to always work to protect the reputation and honor of our neighbors (see no. 2479).

Gossip can, in fact, prove to be a very serious sin. After all, the Catechism reminds us: "No one is bound to reveal the truth to someone who does not have the right to know it" (no. 2489). When we have gossiped, especially if we are aware we have damaged another person's good name or reputation, we want to make every effort to undo the damage we have done, including seeking the grace and forgiveness offered in the Sacrament of Reconciliation. ©LPi

### **Choosing to Love One Another**

Love one another. The greatest commandment, the simplest commandment — and if you've ever loved anyone, you know it's also the hardest.

I'm man enough to admit it. I've seen one or two of those cheesy Hallmark movies that are especially popular around the holidays. Boy meets Girl. Boy and Girl encounter a catastrophic roadblock to their relationship — they're coaches of rival high school volleyball teams, or he runs a dog kennel and she works at a feline rescue, so it could never, ever work out, right? But sprinkle a little movie magic over the whole situation and Boy and Girl find what Hallmark tells us is true love.

I could make a list of all the things that are inaccurate about these movies, and something I would put right near the top maybe even above the sometimes-unbelievable storylines is the idea that love is a feeling.

See, I'm not sure if it's accurate to call these movies love stories. Attraction stories, sure. But if you've ever forgiven someone who's hurt you, nursed a dying parent, gotten up for an infant's night feeding or let your kid have the last piece of cake, you know that real love is a verb. It's something you do. And it is almost always a choice.

Love one another. How often do we hear this? How often do we think about what it really means? How often do we take a moment to consider the action Jesus is asking us to take and the choice he is asking us to make?

## SOCIAL JUSTICE SOCIAL ACTION

May is Mental Health Awareness Month. At St. John's, we are recognizing mental health awareness by beginning an 8-week course called Sanctuary, which is designed to help us understand mental health, mental illness and other related issues. The course began on April 29. This course will likely be offered again in the future.

The Mental Health Committee of the National Catholic Partnership on Disability offers 10 things that parish leaders should know. Actually, we all should know them. The list is below:

## **10 Facts Parish Leaders Should Know About Mental Illness**

**1.** Mental Illness is a disease of the brain and is not a moral issue

**2.** One in four families are directly affected by mental illness. If you don't encounter persons or families dealing with mental illness in your parish then, they are either hiding (often in plain sight) or feel unwelcome. What you see is often the tip of the iceberg

**3.** Stigma isolates people, and sometimes kills both body and soul

**4.** The symptoms of mental illness vary in intensity and over time and so should support. Each situation is unique.

**5.** The public mental health system is at or above capacity, this is why it's important to help people find help.

**6.** Many persons with serious and persistent mental illness do not know they are sick and think their behavior and beliefs are normal

**7.** Persons with mental illness are more likely to be harmed than to do harm.

**8.** Mental illness is often linked with alcoholism and substance abuse

**9.** Poverty and underemployment are pervasive among persons with mental illness. Many of the problems of persons with serious mental illness has more to do with their poverty than their disease

**10.** Understand the importance of making and keeping good boundaries





## Small Group FAQ

#### 1. What is a small group?

Small groups are made up of 8-10 people who meet on a regular basis for the purpose of connecting relationally with one another, growing spiritually through prayer, bible study fellowship, and serving together. In short, small groups encourage all members to worship, connect, grow, and serve as missionary disciples.

#### 2. Are small groups biblical?

The book of Acts is very clear about how God intends for His people to grow and have their needs met in the church. "They devoted themselves to the apostles teaching and to the fellowship, to the breaking of bread, and to prayer. All the believers were together and had everything in common. ## Make a difference in the life of a fostered child — even if you can't foster one yourself

May is National Foster Care Month. It's a time to recognize that we each can play a part in enhancing the lives of children and youth in foster care.

Though the number of kids and their needs are immense, many of the solutions are small. All you have to do is think of helping just one kid.

Here are some easy ways to help make a difference in the life of a foster child and for the family caring for that child.

Pray for these children, their foster and biological families. Pray for the workers who put in long hours and face difficult barriers. Pray for the courts and policy makers. Pray that you might be used by God to show love, fill a need or bring a smile.

### Clothing

When a child comes into care, they often come to a strange new home with nothing but the clothes on their backs. We, like many other foster families, have extra hand-me-downs sorted by size and gender.

However, we have also gotten kids that are different age/gender than the clothing we have on hand. We have recently been able to go to Lawrence Sunshine Foundation, the local clothes closet, instead of making a mad and expensive dash to the store.

This is only possible because others have donated. Yes, even gently used clothing can benefit children in care.

## Meals

No one thinks twice about taking a meal to the parents of a newborn. It isn't as common to think of taking a meal to a family with a new placement.

Honestly, even having a simple meal delivered to us is appreciated. It is one less detail we have to worry about in the midst of new kids adjusting to a place, our family adjusting to them, and social worker and doctor appointments.

Offer to bring a foster family a meal during the first week of a new placement, and I guarantee you will not be turned away! Well, if the dish you're offering is liver and onions, you might be turned away.

## Appointments

These kids have a lot more appointments than the average kiddo! In one week, I may be taking them to the doctor, have a home visit from my family's support worker, their support worker, take them to a visit with one or both parents, and have a court hearing.

There are people who volunteer with their local agency to pick kids up and drive them to some of these appointments when their foster parents can't, usually because of work obligations. Contact a local social work agency and see if you could volunteer one morning or afternoon a week.



### **Baby-sitting**

All baby-sitters for foster kids have to pass a background check with the foster family's licensing agency. This means one additional hurdle for the parents to plan anything like a night out or even attend required training. Tell your friends who are foster parents that you would be glad to submit to the background check and keep the kids once a month for a couple of hours. Believe me, having a night out, even just for dinner or a movie, can really recharge the parents spending all their time and energy pouring into these kids.

### Give

Donate to foster care causes. From welcome boxes, gift cards or backpacks and school supplies, you can help provide needed items to foster children and families. Designate a foster care agency to benefit from your United Way donation, day of service or Amazon Smile donation.

Have your child's youth group collect carbon monoxide detectors, smoke detectors or first aid kits to donate to an agency. Provide activity books and crayons to an agency to help kids pass the time waiting for appointments.

Talk to your friends who are foster parents and ask them what specific things they need — they might be things you would never guess. (We have neighbors who walk our dogs, freeing our time for the kids.) They may want help with chores or errands. Even better than asking in a general way is offering specific help. Use the National Foster Care and Adoption Directory to find a local agency to partner with to help children in foster care. Ask how you can help; maybe they need your party planning skills for their next foster parent appreciation event.

If you have read this far, you might be the person I should ask to open your home in addition to your heart. Consider becoming a respite home, taking placements according to your schedule (often on the weekends).

Don't let the fact that you are uncertain how to help keep you from action. A great first step is to reach out to a foster family or agency.

You can be part of God's plan for a child in care.
