SOCIAL JUSTICE SOCIAL ACTION

Again, we are partnering with Catholic Charities and Centro Hispano to help families in our Lawrence community who are living in poverty. Again this year, we hope to provide households with a food voucher so that they can buy food to go with the turkey they will be receiving for

Thanksgiving from Catholic Charities.

Now here are a few more tips to help you live a more environmentally friendly lifestyle:

31. Bring your own coffee cup

Instead of buying coffee in a paper or plastic cup every time you need a coffee fix, buy an insulated coffee mug and fill it up at home with your daily coffee. That one plastic/paper cup of coffee daily can quickly accumulate as waste by the end of the year.

32. Swap tea bags for loose leaf tea in a reusable strainer What most of us don't know is that tea bags have plastic in them. They may be convenient to use but they do their damage to the environment. Use loose-leaf tea instead. For more ease of use, get a teapot with infuser.

33. Replace dryer sheets with reusable dryer balls

Ditch dryer sheets for dryer balls. The balls help in conserving water and energy as they soak up more water. Your drier thus uses less time and energy to dry your laundry.

34. Use a refillable water bottle

Instead of buying bottled water all the time, buy a good quality non-disposable eco-friendly water bottle and use it on the daily.

35. Rechargeable batteries

Batteries contain extremely toxic chemicals that can cause soil and water pollution. Batteries normally end up in landfills. Reduce this waste by using rechargeable batteries. You'll save money and the earth.

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP

Giving Until it Hurts

In the time of Christ, sacrifice was nothing new to the Jewish people. The Israelites were experts at sacrifice. So, after centuries of every kind of offering imaginable, what was so special about Christ's? What made it so different from the sacrifices offered by the Levitical priests for centuries before his death?

Well, to adequately answer that question would consume whole volumes. And, of course, the first and most important reason is that Christ was the son of God and the savior of the world, not a random (if "unblemished") lamb offering. It was only by the blood of Christ that we could be redeemed.

But another answer is this: Christ's sacrifice cost him. In fact, it

cost him everything. The offerings made by the Israelites through their priests cost them too, of course. They gave of their flocks, of their household stores, of their wealth. But Christ gave differently. He gave of himself. He gave until it was all gone.

Such is the highest form of stewardship: the gift of self to the point of discomfort. It can take a multitude of forms and I am not saying we are all called to be nailed to the cross. In fact, for most of us, our gifts will not involve physical discomfort at all. But certainly, stewardship demands discomfort. It demands that we go against our human nature of putting ourselves first, of thinking primarily of our own needs and desires. And most of all, it demands love. For that, above all else, distinguished the gift Christ gave us.



FOCUS ON THE WORD

GOSPEL MEDITATION

33rd Sunday in Ordinary Time

"And then they will see 'the Son of Man coming in the clouds' with great power and glory." Take a moment to ponder these words from today's Gospel. How does this image make you feel? For people to truly understand the significance of this message, something profound has to happen within. If we find ourselves reacting with a sense of dread or fear, we have to step back and ask why. Our answer will reveal a great deal about our relationship with God. It's hard to fall in love with a God of whom we are afraid. God does not want us to be afraid. Nor does He want us to align our wills to His in order to avoid some kind of horrendous eternal consequence. That sounds like too much of a superficial power play on the part of God who continues to seek out His children in love.

In order for these words to carry any type of significant meaning for us, they have to resonate with and touch us on a deeper level. They have to be able to connect some dots and have meaning for us in order for this promise to change our lives. Sometimes we get preoccupied with the uncertainty of our deaths. Not knowing when or how we will eventually die can be unsettling. But, more so than needing an answer to the "when"

of death, the "what" of death answer we provide has more significance. What happens to us when we die? Whether we die during the natural course of our lives or when Christ comes again, the experience is the same. If we believe that we are meant to live in union with God eternally and that death completes and does not diminish us, then it is worth our time and effort to wait in vigilant hope of the Lord's coming in glory. Our journey back to God is something beautiful to be desired, not dreaded or feared.

Sadly, many folks believe that life is no more than a random occurrence without any purposeful direction or meaning. Death is simply death and nothing more. For them, the Second Coming of Christ and God's eternal promise have no meaning. When we understand the truth about who we are, it changes things up. We then can see ourselves as works in progress who have the choice to either resist the inspirations of the Divine Artist or give into the wonderful creativity of His will. Life awaiting the fullness of Christ to come becomes an unfolding of Divine surprises and abundant joy. God is eternally merciful, forgiving, and welcoming. It is only when we directly reject this gift and turn our backs on Love itself that we have anything to fear.

ST. ELIZABETH OF HUNGARY | FEAST DAY NOVEMBER 17


Although her life was short, St. Elizabeth of Hungary (1207 – 1231) is recognized for her love of the poor and suffering, and as patroness of Catholic charities and the Secular Franciscan Order. The daughter of the King of Hungary, she chose a life of penance instead of leisure, which made an impact on the "commoners" she served.



St. Elizabeth married Louis of Thuringia when she was 14. Deeply in love, they had three children. Despite their wealth, she led a life of prayer, sacrifice, and service to the poor and sick under the spiritual direction of a Franciscan friar.

After six years of marriage, her husband died in the Crusades, and St. Elizabeth was grief-stricken. Her husband's family did not look kindly upon her and mistreated her before finally throwing her out of the palace. However, the return of her husband's allies from the Crusades resulted in her being reinstated, since her son was legal heir to the throne.

St. Elizabeth joined the Secular Franciscan Order in 1228 where she cared for the poor in a hospital she founded in honor of St. Francis of Assisi. She died in 1231, but her great popularity resulted in her being named a saint only four years later. ©LPi

CUENTO NÚMERO 9

Cuando en Babilonia se quedaron en el ropero las guitarras y los bombos (Salmo 136, 1-5)

Hace mucho pero mucho tiempo, casi no tengo memoria de ello, los hijos del Pueblo de Dios vivieron un largo exilio de cuarenta años en Babilonia, y esos pobres no podían hacer otra cosa sino llorar y llorar, acordándose de su tierra, de su tierra, de sus paisajes, de sus poemas, de su sol y sus estrellas, su cielo y su luna, del aroma de sus flores y del encanto de sus viñas.

No era los mismo en Babilonia, tierra foránea. ¿Qué hicieron, entonces? Colgaron sus citaras y sus platillos. Las flautas enmudecieron, en largo luto. El canto se hizo silencio, porque los oídos extranjeros son sordos a otras voces, salvo que ese oído deje de ser extraño.

Una vez conocí a un israelita de La Quiaca, o sea, a un jujeño parecido a los israelitas de Jerusalén. No era ni joven ni viejo. Las sacudidas de la vida lo obligaron a recalar en Babilonia, sobre el Rio de la Plata, llamada hoy Buenos Aires. En sus pagos, el aire era liviano y transparente. En Buenos Aires, no era ni aire ni liviano, sino hecho de humo y de aguas sucias que cuelgan de los cielos: ese producto llamado smog. En su tierra, las vicuñas y las cabras eran amiga, y la leche espumosa v tibia abundaba.

En Buenos Aires, el pobre Rosendo – así se llamaba nuestro amigo – entraba en algún nuevo y rutilante Super-Market, y podía encontrar mil cosas congeladas, comidas dietéticas en el freezer, hechas por la ciencia conjunta del Dr. Cormillot y el Gato Dumas. En su extremo Noroeste, los vecinos eran prójimos, y los extranjeros no existían, salvo los bolivianos, que eran lo mismo que los jujeños. En la gran Ciudad, los nombres tenían entidad solo en el DNI, pero no eran rostros ni voces ni silencios, sino títulos impresos por una máquina de escribir y con el sello y la firma de un funcionario: eran documentos de identidad que no identificaban a nadie, pues no fraguaban sus lágrimas ni sus risas, sus manos callosas llenas de dolor y tierra, sus pasos cansinos trepando de monte en monte, sus hijos con caras impasibles y corazones sensibles.

En Jujuy, se mateaba y se coqueaba, intercalando palabras serenas de vecino a vecino, de comadre a comadre. En Babilonia, no se hablaba, no se oía: no había tiempo para intimar, pero medio mundo iba por la calle con su teléfono celular, para estar al tanto, ¡al segundo!, de las noticias, que no son lo mismo que las palaras y las voces. Todo era eficiencia y horarios. Se hablaba de "agendar" (solo allí se enteró de que cosa era una "agenda" ...).

En la Quiaca, las bagualas eran amigas de los bombos, y los charangos bailaban carnavalitos saltarines, y las guitarras eran acunadas como niñas, en los brazos cariñosos de los cantores. En Buenos Aires-Babilonia, se iba por la calle con un walk-man soldado a los oídos. ¿Qué oían esos caminantes? Nadie sino ellos lo saben. Y, posiblemente, ni ellos.

¿Babilonia... New York... Tokio... Paris... Buenos Aires...? Los mismo da... Los pies no reconocen la tierra que pisan, y el sol es oscuro.

Si quieres tocar el charango en Pekín, te saldrá, sonará... pero será "un concierto de charango", muy típico, pero nada más que eso. Si interpretar una balalaika en Santiago del Estero, con seguridad que todos saldremos corriendo, espantados.

Cada instrumento exige su paisaje, y las palabras y las voces tendrán sentido con una condición: que, "antes", cante el corazón.


