

LENTEN OBLIGATIONS

All Catholics 14 years of age and older are obliged to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, March 2, and all the Fridays of Lent. Catholics 18 to 59 years of age are obliged to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday — a fast consisting of one normal meal and two lesser meals, with no eating in between. It is also recommended that Catholics find opportunities throughout the Lenten season to complement their fasts with prayer, reception of the Sacraments of Reconciliation and the Eucharist, and positive works of charity.

CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION MONTH

Did you know... Child abuse comes in many forms. Most people identify child abuse as physically hitting a child. Neglect is also a form of abuse. Failing to provide a child with proper nutrition, housing and supervision can cause irreparable harm. Expectations that a child be an active participant in the care of home and family, or even ageappropriate jobs is a part of healthy development. But excessive demands can cross into a form of servitude that is beyond the societal norms. Child pornography is a form of sexual abuse, with real victims in every image. The viewing of these images is an offence against the human dignity.

VIRTUS, PROTECTING GOD'S CHILDREN FOR ADULTS

All employees of the Archdiocese (including clergy and consecrated laymen and laywomen) and all volunteers (including Vacation Bible School volunteers), over the age of 18, who have substantial contact with children and/or youth, in the school or church, are required to submit a background check and attend VIRTUS, the awareness session of the Archdiocese's child abuse program, Protecting God's Children for Adults, prior to working with children or youth.

All VIRTUS sessions are online, **however, this will be changing soon**. You will need to register an account with our Archdiocese and complete the background check and paperwork.

Go to: https://www.virtusonline.org.

- 1. Click on "First-Time Registrant"
- 2. Click on "Begin the registration process."
- 3. On the "Select" organization drop-down menu, select "Kansas City in Kansas (Archdiocese)".
- 4. Create a User ID and Password, complete the profile information, and select a class to attend.
- 5. You must complete the background check and paperwork at this point.

6. Plan to have 20-30 minutes to register and complete the online paperwork. The system will not allow you to save what you start working on and return at a later time to complete. DO NOT USE THE BACK BUTTON ON THE ADDRESS BAR, OR IT WILL DELETE YOUR PROGRESS AND YOU WILL HAVE TO START OVER.

7. VIRTUS Registration MUST BE DONE ON A COMPUTER, not a tablet, iPad or phone. The system will not allow these devices due to security reasons.

SOCIAL JUSTICE SOCIAL ACTION

Recently, Daniel P. Horan, OFM., identified five Christian virtues that we might use to help us in building and living in a new normal. These ideas are intriguing and are worth sharing:

1. Patience

While Thomas Aquinas argues that the virtue of patience is not technically the "greatest" of the virtues, in the age of pandemic — and this liminal period of pandemic-toward-endemic — patience may be the most important virtue. People are tired, worn down, frightened and approaching reentry into social and public life with understandable trepidation. The hardship and suffering that this pandemic has wrought does not justify treating other people with disrespect, but the circumstances can help explain why so many people are less tolerant and exercise less restraint on personal bad behavior.

We need to consciously remember to be patient with others and ourselves as we continue to adjust to changing circumstances. As a frequent traveler before the pandemic,Fr. Dan believes he cultivated a practice of forbearance and patience that served him well in the course of the many small and large inconveniences and frustrations that come with being so itinerant. However, as he's eased back into traveling more often again, he has noticed ways that he feels more easily irritable and annoyed. What was once second nature is now a virtue in need of practice and cultivation.

2. Humility

Working on humility, for him, means owning his limitations and acknowledging the impacts of the last two years of challenge, loss and suffering.

Humility. He needs to recognize that this pandemic has and continues to exert a noticeable toll on him as it does on so many others. It is OK to do less, to take one's time, to recognize that just as it was not easy to stop the whole world in March 2020, it is not easy to restart it now. Working on humility means owning our limitations and acknowledging the impacts of the last two years of challenge, loss and suffering, while also accepting that there are long-term consequences that will manifest in various ways.

3. Empathy

In many ways, this characteristic flows from both patience and humility. Fr. Dam believes that a lot of the disrespectful behavior we have been witnessing in public arises in part from a lack of empathy. Everyone is dealing with these challenging times differently. We have to remember that we may not know others' burdens, sorrows or suffering, and so we should treat everybody with love and understanding. Something as simple as remembering that others are also going through hardships can make a major difference.

4. Trust

This pandemic has made even the most trusting person suspicious of others, if only as potential vectors of COVID-19. This skepticism has combined with the conspiracy theories and nonsense of the disinformation age, resulting in widespread distrust of others in general and public authorities in particular. But in order for us to move toward a better way of living and being in the world, we need to build back our sense of trust.

5. Flexibility

If there's one thing that the pandemic has taught Fr. Dan, it is that he needs to be more flexible. The luxury of sure plans and inflexible schedules is a thing of the past (if they ever existed). One thing that appears over again in the gospels is Jesus's ability to respond to whatever and whoever is before him with grace and hospitality, including during unpredictably stressful times such as when thousands needed to be fed (Matt 14:13-21, Lk 9:12-17). How are we adjusting to changing circumstances?

These virtues and characteristics are not a panacea for all that we continue to face during these challenging times, but they may help us to navigate the uncertain road ahead in a manner reflecting our shared Christian vocation.

BE STILL IN GOD'S PRESENCE

TO DO GOD'S WORK WE MUST ALSO SOMETIMES JUST SIT IN HIS PRESENCE by Catherine Upchurch Special to The Leaven

Good engineers know the value of a counterbalance. Whether for a seesaw, elevator or a forklift, the design has to allow for weights to balance one another. Without that balance, a child will go flying off the seat of the seesaw, an elevator will plummet and a forklift will tip over on itself.

We are designed with a need for a counterbalance as well. We cannot simply be busy doing the work of the kingdom without the balancing gift and discipline of stillness.

One way to enter into stillness and silence in God's presence, to calm ourselves so that we are more aware of God, is to use this simple verse from Psalm 46:11: "Be still and know that I am God." Through the psalmist, God is giving a direction that will slow our pace, take away the "hurry" of our days and maybe even help us let go of some worry as well. Take a deep breath, sit comfortably and say the verse within yourself. Ponder who God is to you. Call to mind the ways that you most often experience God's presence.

After a few moments of quietly focusing on God, strip away the end of that verse and sit in silence with these words: "Be still and know that I am." God revealed himself to Moses in the Sinai desert as "I AM" (Ex 3:11-14). God is the cause of all being.

Throughout the Gospel of John, Jesus revealed his divine identity when he said, "I am . . ." the good shepherd; the gate for the sheep; the light of the world; the way and the truth and the life; the resurrection and the life; and the true vine. When you sit in stillness and contemplate God's power in our world, begin with acknowledging that God is the creative power of all that is and the abiding presence in all that will be.

And now we focus even more deeply on the gift of stillness by stripping away a bit more of the verse, saying in our hearts and minds, "Be still and know." We tend to focus on knowing as the act of sorting through information to make sense of reality, and in the spiritual context, that sometimes means gaining knowledge about God. While acquiring knowledge is a significant part of our growth as humans, as disciples, the Bible invites us to think of knowing, especially knowing God, as a kind of intimacy that we share with God. It comes in the form of a loving relationship with God. In stillness, you will grow in love and in trust of the God who fashioned you and abides with you.

By now, you know that we will remove a couple more words to be left with "Be still." Stillness allows us the space we need to hear God's voice. Mary, mother of Jesus, is said to have reflected



or pondered or treasured in her heart the things divinely revealed to her by an angel, by shepherds and through the events of Jesus' young life (Lk 2:15-20, 41-52). Such reflection requires stillness. Quiet yourself, be aware of your breathing which is itself a gift from God.

And we are left with "Be." By now, your breathing is a bit deeper, your body is a bit quieter and you might hear God saying simply, "Let me look on you in love." God's love is at the heart of our being and becomes the basis for how we act as disciples.

Creating the discipline of being still in the presence of God's love will direct your heart and your feet as you move from being to doing, from stillness to action. It is the necessary counterbalance for a life of discipleship.

Questions for reflection or discussion Jesus knew the need for quiet time with his Father (see Mt 14:13; Mk 1:32-35; 6:45-46; 14:32-34; Lk 4:42; 5:16; 9:18; Jn 6:15). In what circumstances are you most often reminded to seek out God in quiet?

When you consider your own life as a disciple of Jesus, do you feel that you have found a balance between doing God's work and being in God's presence? If not, are you more drawn to stillness and prayer or works of love and service?

What are some ways that you might create more time for stillness in God's presence? Or, if this is already your practice, how might you continue to grow in the discipline of quiet meditation on God's love and life in you?

Do other Bible verses speak to you in a way that they could become the basis for your quiet meditation in God's presence? For a few examples, see 1 Cor 3:16; Lk 12:25; Ps 51:12; Jn 15:9.

Los diez enfermos de sida (Lucas 17, 11-19)

En una sala especial del Hospital Muñiz, en Buenos Aires, había diez enfermos de SIDA: dos, por homosexualidad; seis, por intercambio de jeringas en consumo de drogas; uno, un heterosexual que se contaminó con una prostituta, y el décimo, un pobre muchacho de quince años, sidótico por una transfusión de sangre no controlada, después de una operación común. Ninguno era portador sano, sino que su suerte estaba sellada, y su destino, cerrado. Probaban en ellos lo conocido, y todos los días, devoraban los diarios, ante los chimentos de una "vacuna"

Fueron pasando los días y los meses. Tres de estas personas murieron. Otros tres estaban al borde del abismo. A uno de ellos, Isaac Rudmann, lo fue a visitar un buen rabino, y lo sacó vendiendo almanagues. ¡Que no le vinieran a hablar de la misericordia de Dios, cuando él estaba padeciendo esta situación! A otro, que estaba en estado bastante crítico, una enfermera, canchera en estas lides, le mandó al cura párroco. ¡Fue peor el remedio que la enfermedad!, porque el sacerdote le echó en cara que todo esto era por culpa suya, y que lo mejor era poner las barbas en remojo. Remató todo. pontificando así: -Dios perdona siempre; el hombre, a veces; la naturaleza... ¡nunca! Padeció la misma mala suerte que su colega, el rabino. Es verdad que, antes de irse, el cura le dijo que pusiera su confianza en Dios, pero...el tipo estaba lo suficientemente golpeado como para sufrir otro "uppercut" en la mandíbula. Los médicos, excelentes personas, los animaban a no bajar la guardia. Varios "voluntarios" de diversas asociaciones, los visitaban, sin miedo al contagio y sin discriminarlos.

Perdí de vista a los siete que sobrevivieron.

Años más tarde, charlando con la enfermera, me enteré de que fueron visitados por integrantes del "Movimiento carismático", que no sé bien qué hacen, pero sí que son rezadores y algo sanadores.

Les regalaron un librito que había escrito el padre Juan Pablo, con diversas "Cartas", una de ellas dirigida a un enfermo de SIDA. Al poco tiempo de esa visita, comenzó la mejoría de todos, para estupor y sorpresa de los médicos.

También nos enteramos de que seis de ellos habían vuelto a la droga y a su ambiente habitual. Jaime, quien no tenía otra culpa sino la transfusión desgraciada, fue el único que visitó a los muchachos y chicas de Movimiento; y él, que se profesaba todo un ateo, a los quince años, resultó el más agradecido por el libro, regalo de Dios o de quien creamos que vino.

No supe del resto, pero, por los hechos, no creo que reconocieran el don de la salud recobrada y de la vida conservada, porque volvieron a sumergirse en las raíces de la muerte. No hay cosa más triste que la ingratitud ante los beneficios recibidos.

Si llegas a tener SIDA, o lepra, o pie plano o gripe o mal de ojo, y Dios o tus hermanos te curan, se un bien nacido: dale gracias a Dios y a tus benefactores. Si eres judío, ve a la sinagoga y que tu rabino te ayude a rezar. Si ateo, piensa que hay algo
