## Welcome!

Come join us on a tour through the structure and history of St. John the Evangelist Catholic Church. In 1924, this 131 by 50-foot building cost \$70,000 to build. St. John's was built in Romanesque style architecture.

Acomerstone on the church's northeast corner notes three important events — the church's first Mass in Lawrence in 1857, the erection of the second church in 1871, and the construction of the present church in 1924.

Visitors enter the church through the small vestibule or fover from Kentucky Street. This entrance is reminiscent of the courtyards and plazas that served as gathering areas in ancient churches. The GyRoom is to your left. The holy water fonts located just inside the sanctuary are filled with blessed water. As they bless themselves with this water, Catholics are reminded of their baptism.

During the daytime rays of sun stream through the 56 stained-glass windows into the sanctuary. The colorful windows portray biblical events and Catholic beliefs. The small clerestory windows above the roofline depict

various saints. The windows were crafted using techniques brought from Germany by craftspeople who established the former Munich Studio of Chicago. Memorials and donations financed the stained-glass windows.

The 14 hanging shrines that adom the walls between the larger windows are known as The Stations of the Gross. These shrines recreate the last footsteps of Jesus' life on earth, and those reflecting on the stations say a brief prayer before each small shrine. In our times, a 15th station that remembers the Resurrection often is added to this devotion.

Looking back to the choir loft you can see the rose window that depicts St. Cecelia, the patron of music. The many pipes encircling the loft come from our Reuter organ. This world famous organ company, which is located in Lawrence, produced its 42nd organ and our first in 1920. Fire destroyed the church and the organ in 1924 and 40 years later the church purchased its current Reuter organ #1479.

The altar and ambo at the east end are the focal point of the sanctuary. In

the original design, the church had a Renaissance - style altar. That altar was removed in the 1960's and a free standing altar was installed. It was replaced with the present one in 1992. The partition wall behind the altar is known as the reredos. The arches of the reredos behind the alter continues the roundtopped arch motif of the nave side aisles. The tabernacle, located on a stand behind the altar, contains the Blessed Sacrament. Those who visit the homebound come to the tabernacle for the hosts they will take to the sick and dying members of the parish. The red sanctuary lamp indicates the presence of the reserved sacrament. The altar and other liturgical furnishings, including the crucifix, were designed and crafted by local artisans.

The church's bell tower reaches high above the roof. The original bell cast in St. Louis in 1859 rang faithfully for many years. Over time the repeated vibrations weakened the structure, and from the late 50's the bell was silent until the tower and bell supports were repaired and strengthened in 1983. The bell can now be safely rung.

In 1999, the bell tower took on a new look when the addition of the ground level entrance and elevator were added on the north side of the church. This extension also includes a new devotional charel dedicated to St. Padre Pio that allows the Blessed Sacrament to be exposed for private devotion. In this newentrance stands the original baptismal font from the former baptistery which is now the Gy Room. Visitors leaving the church through the new addition walk out onto a brick patio known as the Walk of Faith. The engraved bricks include names memorialized or honored by donors to the remodeling project.


